Dues and Donations

Membership dues are payable upon joining and renew on January 1st of each year. Donations to support the club are always welcome. Dues and donations may be paid by cash or check at any monthly GCARC meeting and by mail, or by using a credit or debit card online at the GCARC website.

GCARC, ARES, and SKYWARN Patches

GCARC club patches are available and may be purchased at each club meeting; cost is \$5.00 each. These are round patches with the club logo, and are great for wearing on vests and other non-club clothing, placing on equipment bags, go-kits, etc.

ARES and SKYWARN patches may also be purchased at each club meeting; cost is \$4.00 each. If you choose to wear patches on your club shirt or jacket, we recommend ARES members place the ARES patch first on the right shoulder and any other patch (SKYWARN, RACES, CERT, etc.) should go below it. Since some members have tactical shirts with pen pockets on the left sleeve we do not recommend placing any patches on that side.

Several times each year, members have the opportunity to purchase club-related clothing (shirts, caps, jackets, etc.). These items have the GCARC logo and the member's name and callsign embroidered on them. An order form with instructions will be included in the newsletter each time orders are being taken.

Grayson County ARC Meeting Minutes 7/17/2018

Meeting minutes recorded by Lee, N5SLY, as Jim, K5QOI, was unable to attend.

Meeting started at 7 PM

14 members and guests attended.

DeLisa and her son Klint Catalane were our special guests this evening. Klint is working on getting his Technician license. Gave them some information to get them started and invited them to attend our Red River Bridge War Special Event at Perrin Field Museum next Saturday.

Also had several visitors from the Kiwanis in attendance to update us on the upcoming Red River Bike Rally in August.

Treasurers Report was given and was approved by all.

Field Day results were reviewed. 260 QSO's – 198 CW and 62 Phone. Results have been forwarded to ARRL so they know that we participated. A good time was had by all who attended. However many members have recommended that a new site be used next year, so we are going to start looking now for a new site. If you have any recommendations please let the club know.

The Red River Bridge War Special Event is going on all week and members can operate any time they want to using any band and mode. The only requirement is that they follow the band plan for the license they hold and send their logs to Lee, N5SLY, when the event is over. We will be setting up at Perrin Field Museum on Saturday, July 21 from 8:30 AM until about 3:30 PM. Lee, N5SLY, will bring the club radio and arrange to have the clubs vertical antenna on site during the event. Mark, KF5UZW, committed to contacting the museum about our visit on Saturday and getting our tower project moving along at the museum. At least 5 members said they would be attending along with several others guests that said they would attend as well.

The Kiwanis Red River Bike Rally was discussed. The routes have been set up as well as the rest stops. Visit http://redriverbikerally.com/index.php for information about the event. The club has committed to providing communication assistance again this year. We are going to need about 20 or 25 volunteers. There will be 10 rest stops and we'll need one person at each one. There are 5 routes and we'll need a mobile station for each one plus a couple more Rover mobile stations. Mark, KF5UZW, and Trevor, KG5BFI, will serve as Net Control. We'll be using the 444.750 Repeater as the 147.000 is still not reliable. If you will able to help with this event please let us know.

CW Corner

I submit a CW column article each month called the 'CW Corner'. This column is supposed to be it. It appears that there is not much interest in CW these days, which may be partly due to the new digital modes. I have been slacking lately on CW too. So here you have an old dog, who was raised on CW now trying out the new digital modes, learning new tricks. For the past year or so, I've been involved working the digital modes of JT65, JT9 and the newest and now most popular digital mode of FT8. I operated at the Bridge River War Event at Perrin Field this past Saturday, and had lots of fun, even though I didn't make many contacts on CW. I enjoyed the comradery with other members who attended the event, and we even talked about things not even involved in amateur radio that we had mutual interest in. It was a great get-together, at least it was the way that I felt. Several club members showed up in the midst of the heatwave. It was nearly 110 degrees outside, and wouldn't you know it, the vertical antenna being used for 20 meter operations blew over later in the day, which put an end to the SSB operation on 20. I decided to let Marvin Schiavone – KG5GMA use my antenna which was the 6-band Hustler vertical that I put up at the airbase for the event. It was mounted on a 5 foot pipe, of which 4 feet was pounded in the ground. It wasn't going to blow over. I didn't care if the other station used it, because I seemed to want to talk to the members who showed up at the event instead of operating. But at the time, the operations would come to a halt anyway because it was late in the afternoon.

It's been a crazy month of July for me this year, being retired, not knowing what I want to do first, especially when it comes to this hobby. But there are only a certain number of seconds in a day, 86,400 seconds to be exact. And of course there are honey-do's to get done. I think I was planning at least 186,400 seconds per day to do what I wanted to do when I retire. I could not make allot of time for the Bridge River War event, not as much as I would have liked and most of it wasn't on CW when I did operate. This CW Corner report which I would like to call it, turned into much more than just a CW report, as this past weekend had a strange twist to it. Now, read a story within a story.

I have really come to like FT-8 and I could not stay away from that mode during the event. After putting up with the heat on Saturday, I decided to put up my vertical antenna at my home QTH again and work the event from home. The temperature was at least 110F in Anna, Texas when I put the vertical back up on Saturday evening at my home. Then, I fell asleep from exhaustion and didn't wake up until Sunday morning. I ran upstairs to my radio room Sunday morning, turned on the radio to make some 40 meter contacts before the band normally drops off until later in the afternoon, but I heard nothing. Surely there should still be some activity on 40 meters at 9:00 AM. Then I noticed that the SWR was very high. I looked outside at my 40 meter dipole and wouldn't you know it, the antenna was laying on the ground. So I put it back up on Sunday morning. But, wait just one minute. Tuning around the bands, I discovered that the 6-meter band was wide open, at least from the time that I discovered it at 9:00AM until late in the afternoon. I remembered I was able to previously load my 40 meter sloping dipole on 6 meters with a tuner and it performed quite well. I needed to make some quick contacts, because my log for the event was pretty empty, and it didn't look good.

So what the heck. I decided to try and make a few FT8 6-meter contacts using the W5I call. I configured the FT8 program I use - WSJT-X with the W5I call, and called CQ. Stations started calling me in groups of 3. At one time, I had 5 stations call me all at once. I felt that I was in a DX-Pedition, working from a remote island that everybody wanted to work. I didn't realize that my 40 meter sloping dipole worked so great on 6 meters. Boy, was I so wrong. Now get this. Come to find out, I wasn't using my 40 meter sloping dipole at all. I was using my folded over Huster 6-band vertical. Yes, it was folded over, actually laying on the ground, but tuned on 6 meters using the built in tuner within my Kenwood TS-590SG.



Check the picture above. I made several contacts on 6-meters, using a vertical antenna cut for the HF bands that was lying on the ground. I would have never thought this to be possible. One thing is for sure, now I'm a firm believer of antenna tuners. Was this some type of NVIS phenomenon? My vertical RF signal was going straight up in the sky, as it was laying down in a horizontal plane on the ground.

Here is the list of 9 states that I worked on FT-8 using 6 meters on Sunday, using my Hustler 6 band trap vertical, laying on the ground. VA, AZ, MN, NV, GA, NC, AL, SC, NM. There were a total of 20 FT8 contacts made on 6 meter FT8. Then all at once, the band went dead. One second the band had signals peaking 20 over S9, then all of a sudden - Nothing!

The moral of this story, operate the mode that you enjoy. It's not all about CW. It's really not about just the low bands. Have fun in everything you do. But operate. You don't know what you are missing out of if you don't participate. But I do hope that all who does read this article will work the low bands sometime in there amateur radio careers.

Summer's Big Contest-The IARU HF World Championship-July 14-15

On the cover of the July QST, was a picture of three amateurs involved in what is called "Summer's Big Contest" known as the IARU HF World Championship. The objective is to contact as many other amateurs, especially IARU member society HQ stations, around the world as possible using the 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 meter bands. Being a contest, the new WARC bands 12, 17, and 30 and 60 meter bands are not available for

contesting. This year's contest took place on July 14 and 15. The purpose of the event was to promote awareness of the IARU (International Amateur Radio Union). The IARU consists of over 160 national amateur radio societies around the world. The big contest celebrated around the world is the IARU HF World Championship.

The first reason I even bring this contest up is because many people believe that Field Day is the biggest contest celebrated around the world each year. The fact is, Field Day is not considered a contest, so it would not qualify in any contest standing.

The second reason for this contest mention is because I have decided to become active again in contesting. Added to that is a need for me to become more active in CW. Lately I've been almost totally involved in the digital modes. My desire to get back into contesting may not be a good choice, because I do not have any kind of property to put up antennas that I can use to be competitive in contesting thanks to the HOA that I must donate to each year. So I may just start out with the idea in mind to just have fun and not to earn the certificates and plaques that can be acquired if you really do well in a contest and just use the antennas that I have. Maybe the club would like to sponsor some of these contest activities, but I would only agree to sponsorship by the club if there were other members besides myself interested in working contests. If the club is interested, then using the W5I call may be the ticket to use. Otherwise, if there is no club sponsorship with no others from our club interested in contesting, then I would just consider using my own call for the contests. I've considered using the W5I call for myself, but now have decided against it.

On a few occasions during our club special events, there were contests running on the CW portions of the bands that kind of interfered with operating the special event. To make use of contesters for our club special event, I would actually work the contest as W5I so that I could make several contacts, almost as easy as it is on digital. It was really neat working contests again.

So at the next meeting, I plan to pose a question to the club on whether or not contesting could be stated as a club event. I can list the contests and dates that I would be interested in operating. Of course, that would only work if other members of the club also participated. Our latest new member Mario Alvarez – AI5W is an active CW operator. I know that it may be a far-fetched idea to get other members of our club to operate any CW, let alone to work CW contests. I'll reach out to Mario.

My other option is to contact other hams from other clubs and get a group together consisting of members from different clubs and work contests. Let's discuss this at the next meeting.

Our DARA club isn't quite healthy enough yet for monthly meetings but our 7 pm Sunday K5KIE Durant repeater is healthy with Denison-Sherman checkins appreciated for sure. Maybe we could look at some activity combining the Sherman and Durant clubs. A few of our members made it to your ARRL field day and really enjoyed it.

We hope to sponsor a monthly ACTIVITY to include: tailgate – visit to K5CBL's 160 through UHF freq station – hamburger feed – Tech class in the fall – get back on the air evening for inactive amateurs w/ opportunities to order a VHF-UHF hand held pre-programmed, visit to our new Bryan County Emergency Management Bldg (constructed highly energy efficient, costs expected to be about 1/3 of a regular Bldg), old timers afternoon get-together, visit to Jimmy Green's QTH (he has three 80' towers and an exotic 1.5 MHz through 30 MHz almost flat SWR (new: \$20K) antenna.

We're considering asking for permission some weekend to set up on 160 meters at an unused 1500 KHz AM broadcast antenna. And maybe trek up North of Ardmore to the tall hills then set up on VHF & see if we can get into New Mexico and wherever. Dreams...........

W1AW Operating Schedule

For some members of the club that would like to give CW a try and brush up on their receiving skills, the Amateur Radio Flagship station known as W1AW broadcasts <u>practice CW transmissions</u> on 1.8025, 3.5815, 7.0475, 14.0475, 18.0975, 21.0675, 50.350 and 147.555 MHZ. There are two types of transmissions, known as SLOW CODE and FAST CODE. The speeds for each type are listed immediately below, and the types overlap a little.

SLOW CODE = practice sent at 5, 7.5, 10, 13, and 15 WPM. FAST CODE = practice sent at 35, 30, 25, 20, 15, 13, and 10 WPM.

You can qualify for a W1AW CW certificate or and endorsement if you already have a certificate. Details and prices of either can be found in the July 2018 edition of QST page 101.

There are <u>digital transmissions from W1AW</u> on the following frequencies..

3.5975, 7.095, 14.095, 18.1025, 21.095, 28.095, 50.350, and 147.555 MHZ.

Bulletins are sent using 45.45-baud Baudot, PSK31 in BPSK mode, and MFSK16 on a daily revolving schedule.

W1AW Voice transmissions can be found on the following frequencies..

1.855, 3.99, 7.29, 14.29, 18.16, 21.39, 28.59, 50.350, and 147.555 MHZ.
