GCARC, ARES, and SKYWARN Patches

GCARC club patches are available and may be purchased at each club meeting; cost is \$5.00 each. These are round patches with the club logo, and are great for wearing on vests and other non-club clothing, placing on equipment bags, go-kits, etc.

ARES and SKYWARN patches may also be purchased at each club meeting; cost is \$4.00 each. If you choose to wear patches on your club shirt or jacket, we recommend ARES members place the ARES patch first on the right shoulder and any other patch (SKYWARN, RACES, CERT, etc.) should go below it. Since some members have tactical shirts with pen pockets on the left sleeve we do not recommend placing any patches on that side.

Several times each year, members have the opportunity to purchase club-related clothing (shirts, caps, jackets, etc.). These items have the GCARC logo and the member's name and callsign embroidered on them. An order form with instructions will be included in the newsletter each time orders are being taken.

The GCARC Secretary requested a signed letter from Moe.

We have to vote on all approved paid members, Lee N5SLY 1st and Jessie AC5OY 2nd the motion and all voted for all members present to be members on the books.

CW Presentation - James Frank KW5CW - Using newly club purchased overhead projector.

James offered insight on the art of CW. The fact is the requirements have been minimized to know CW and it's becoming a lost art. Ham Radio Operators are leaning to digital modes. Some older Hams have hearing issues and digital is a way to keep HAMs active. All in all, James had a signup sheet with over 10 interested to learn CW. Knowing CW can be an important asset for emergency situations. James will provide a monthly report on class progress.

Bylaws-A committee was formed to review Bylaw Changes; this meeting we are reviewing all the changes. The committee reviewed how other neighboring counties conduct business. The board will decide on meeting locations to have future meetings.

Most important is how many members make a quorum. Change to 10% from 30% of attending monthly meeting. Active members have paid dues to vote.

How dues are paid anytime during the year and will last for 12 months; new members get 6 months free membership.

Adding an At Hock Board Member bringing count to 5. Three of five need to be present.

A current member is considered active if they do not miss three consecutive meetings.

Next month in August 2019 we will vote on Bylaw changes.

Misc

Roy, VP, brought up an idea to find a cargo trailer we can store our equipment and make it easier to set up for events. Research is needed to find a trailer. Adding an antenna mount to the trailer would be good.

At the end of the meeting, \$23 collected for patches: AARL- 2 at \$4 each and GCARC K5GCC- 3 at \$5 each. KG5BNC \$18 and KG5REK \$5 were the purchasers.


I have many interests outside of ham radio. I have played the piano since I was 4, I play the tuba and the sousaphone in band at school and am learning the bass

QSL Managers Message


It's been busy lately. Hope everyone had a very pleasant 4th of July.

CW CORNER

THE FUTURE OF CW

This month, I was honored to give a short presentation titled "The Future of CW" at our club meeting and also at the McKinney Club meeting. It depicted what CW requirements had within the 5 classes of licenses that existed before, along with what we now have today with the effects that are sure to happen if we don't help others learn the mode. The presentation will be given to all of the clubs that would be open to listen to it at their meetings.

During the next 30 days and into the future, I will seek out any amateur in the area, within the reach of this newsletter which basically contains the DFW area and to the north to the Oklahoma border, and develop a community of CW operators that would be willing to travel to different clubs and re-introduce CW into their club and special events, to include Field Day. My goal would also be to create some contest groups to help area clubs become active in contesting.

As an avid CW operator for the past 53 years, I've come to the realization of the importance of helping others learn and practice their skills on the air within the CW bands. It's even more important now than ever before to mentor others to attain the skills to successfully

operate CW. Within this club, there is very little interest to learn CW, but hopefully my presentation has sparked some interest in learning the mode.

I've given 2 open classes at the courthouse in the past, and there are a few of the students of my classes that are still interested in CW, but most likely haven't worked any CW on the air. My goal is to change that.

Morse Code has been around since 1836, which means that CW has been around for 183 years. That's before TV, any form of AM/FM radio and digital. The average age of a CW operator today is between 60 and 65 years of age. I can safely say this as I've been taking a private survey of all CW contacts that I've made for the past 6 months. Rarely do I work a station where the operator is under 50 years of age, and more often than not, I've been working many stations of operators my age, in the mid-60's and then into the 70's. The oldest ham that I've worked was 93 years of age.

To me, the fact that I'm online working many elderly people who are mostly retired, indicated to me that it is time for someone to help the CW community gain some young blood. The mode is dying. When new hams attain a license, they are no longer introduced to CW, but instead mainly to VHF/UHF phone and digital communications.

From this point on, I'm going to reach out to these new hams once they have a license and find out if they would like to learn and operate CW. Some may not ever learn CW because they were never afforded the opportunity to learn it.

Why is it important that hams learn CW? Well for me, it's allot of fun. I also run mobile CW. I understand that it may not be fun for everyone, so it's not for everyone, just like digital is not for everyone. But what if it would be fun for you? The only time you really hear some real activity on the CW portions of the bands are during contests. For the most part, people think the bands are dead, but they are not. At a recent McKinney meeting and Grayson County meeting, it was mentioned in a digital presentation on FT8 that the digital mode has become popular because the so called 'dead' bands support very weak signals, and you can make digital contacts when you cannot make SSB or CW contacts. Proof that this is NOT totally true would be to listen to a "dead" CW band at the start of a contest. The band just suddenly comes alive with hundreds and thousands of CW operators. The band wasn't dead at all.

For the past few years, I've offered to mentor hams within the Grayson County Club, either in a classroom setting or one-on-one. The offer is still open. But now I've decided to offer this to everyone in the metroplex area. I am now planning to attend all meetings for all the clubs in the DFW area and spreading the word. If someone from another club reads this newsletter and this article and would be interested in hosting me at their meeting to talk about CW, please contact me at my email address (KW5CW@arrl.net) and I can schedule time with your club to put on my presentation.

The day may come when the FCC decides to take away some frequencies because CW is not so popular as it once was. That realization may be coming soon. If the FCC decides to make the SSB portion of each band larger and take dedicated space away from the CW portion of the bands to accomplish it, they can do that, but they could also take away portions and not transfer it for any amateur mode.

Of course, what I'm trying to accomplish here is to get amateurs here involved in CW. What we accomplish may have very little effect of what the FCC does. But we need to stand up and fight and not let this mode just disappear.

I would be a ham without a hobby if CW was taken away. If you would like to learn CW, mentor others or even operate CW either at home or within your club activities, contact me at KW5CW@arrl.net and your journey can begin. Give it a shot and see if CW is for you. Let's help other with Morse code.
